

Indiana University South Bend Chancellor Position Profile

Indiana University invites nominations and applications for the position of Chancellor, Indiana University South Bend. The Chancellor exercises broad responsibilities for all aspects of the academic, student, financial, development, and administrative dimensions of the campus, in coordination with Indiana University's University Administration and the other Indiana University regional campuses. IU seeks an energetic, dynamic individual to lead and engage its faculty, staff, students, alumni, and community in what promises to be an exciting era for the institution and community. The position reports to the Vice President for Regional Campuses and Online Education, Ken Iwama who reports to IU President, Pamela Whitten.



Indiana University South Bend: An Overview

Indiana University South Bend (IU South Bend) is the premier comprehensive public university dedicated to serving the needs of North Central Indiana and beyond. IU South Bend enrolls nearly 4,500 degree-seeking students, making it the largest of the regional campuses of Indiana University. IU South Bend is also the oldest regional campus, offering its first classes in 1916. Programs are offered at the undergraduate and graduate level on campus, online, and at a center in neighboring Elkhart. IU South Bend has 346 faculty, including 115

tenure/tenure track, 83 full-time non-tenure track, and 148 part-time faculty. IU South Bend also employs 247 talented and dedicated staff members who support the mission of the campus. IU South Bend also has a campus center in neighboring Elkhart and the Civil Rights Heritage Center, located in a neighborhood near campus. As a regional campus of Indiana University, students earn an IU degree, right where they live and work, in a small campus environment where they learn from distinguished professors, and all at an affordable price.

An area of distinction for IU South Bend is the commitment to engaged student learning. Faculty regularly work with students in research projects, internships, and service-learning activities, whether it be students conducting research in the lab beside their professors or interning at local nonprofit, municipal, or business organizations. The 2023 *U.S. News and World Report Best Colleges Report* ranked IU South Bend 4th in social mobility among regional public universities in the Midwest, recognizing good graduation rates among students who receive Pell Grants.

Over the past several years IU South Bend has greatly increased its visibility and engagement with economic and community development. The campus recently completed the construction of a \$10 million Dwyer Healthcare Simulation Center to provide nursing and radiography students with state-of-the-art training facilities and is set to start construction of a new Center for Innovation and Entrepreneurship this fall.



History

IU South Bend's history is a mix of tradition and innovation. In 1916 Indiana University began teaching classes in South Bend at Central High School located downtown. In 1961, IU South Bend moved to its current campus location situated on 80 acres along the St. Joseph River in the River Park neighborhood. In 1967, IU South Bend conferred its first degrees.

IU South Bend's mission is focused on regional impact, partnership, and transformation. IU South Bend acknowledges and honors the Indigenous communities native to this region and

recognizes that the campus was built on the homelands and resources of the Potawatomi, Peoria, Myaamia, Kickapoo, Kaskaskia, Mascouten, and Meskwaki people: the past, present, and future caretakers of this land.

Governance

The IU South Bend campus values its tradition of shared governance. The Chancellor and other key administrators work closely with faculty, staff, and students to ensure the governance system operates effectively. The new Chancellor will continue to foster a climate in which discussion is inclusive and reasoned, in order to make timely decisions that will continue to move the campus forward.

IU South Bend is a regional campus of Indiana University. Indiana University is not a system, but a single university with seven campuses. Indiana University is led by one president, Pamela Whitten, and a single Board of Trustees. The regional campuses report to Ken Iwama, IU's Vice President for Regional Campuses and Online Education, and operate collaboratively in many functions. Academic degrees are granted by the university, and the university establishes fundamental policies across all functional areas. In several areas, especially academics, Indiana University has traditionally provided individual campuses with considerable flexibility in applying university policy to the regional campuses' mission. Indeed, responsiveness to mission and region is a core

strength of the Indiana University regional campuses.

Student Success and Student Life



As a student-centered campus, IU South Bend is focused on empowering students to reach their goals so they can advance their lives and the lives of those around them while also making valuable contributions to their community, local organizations, and businesses in the region, state, nation, and world.

IU South Bend provides a variety of services and programming to help students succeed. This includes Athletics, Student Life and Housing, Student Engagement, Career Services, Student Counseling Center, Accessible Educational Services, Titan Success Center, Advising Center, and the ACE Tutoring

Center. The SAC is also open to IU South Bend's faculty and staff.

A five-year project now underway is designed to improve student success among at-risk students thanks to a \$2 million Strengthening Institutions Program (SIP) Grant from the U.S. Department of Education. The grant, one of the most competitive and coveted among Department of Education programs, provides federal aid to eligible institutions of higher education. The project will help the campus accomplish three goals:

- Increase retention of low-income and underrepresented students.
- Improve student achievement in key gateway courses and eliminate achievement gaps.
- Increase 4- and 6-year graduation rates to be more equitable among all IU South Bend undergraduate



student. There are more than 90 student clubs and organizations to choose from, including Titan Productions which is a student organization that plans dances, movie nights, and schedules entertainers and open mic events. Plus, students can participate in intramural sports or work out at the Student Activities Center (SAC), a state-of-the-art athletics facility on campus.

The main IU South Bend campus is located along the banks of the St. Joseph River where students also have an opportunity to live in our River Crossing Campus Housing. These living environments are just one way for students to engage in the campus and surrounding community to

extend their learning to the real world. Students may also join faculty in undergraduate research or community-based projects, become part of the honors program, study abroad, work an internship, or play intercollegiate athletics in one of our 6 sports as part of the Chicagoland Collegiate Athletic Conference (CCAC) of the National Association of Intercollegiate Athletics (NAIA). IU South Bend's student-athletes participate in Men's and Women's Basketball, Women's Volleyball, Softball, Baseball, and Women's Soccer.

Regional Engagement

IU South Bend is not only dedicated to serving our students but the entire region. Several centers allow students, faculty, and staff opportunities to help impact the community.

The <u>Center for a Sustainable Future</u> focuses on the discovery and dissemination of practices and strategies that are ecologically friendly, economically sound, and socially responsible.

The <u>Civil Rights Heritage Center</u>, located in a formally segregated natatorium, preserves and shares the civil rights history of South Bend and surrounding communities.

The <u>American Democracy Project</u> is a multi-campus initiative that seeks to create an intellectual and experiential understanding of civic engagement for undergraduate students.

The <u>IU South Bend Elkhart Center</u> effectively connects IU South Bend's graduate students with essential services serving Elkhart, Indiana, and the greater Michiana community. The Center is home to the IUSB Elkhart Speech-Language Clinic, Rehabilitation Sciences, and advanced health sciences graduate programs in Occupational Therapy and Speech-Language Pathology.

The <u>Center for Community Engagement</u> is increasing awareness of community-engaged work, fostering campus-community partnerships, and supporting the learning community around this work.

The <u>Center for Innovation and Entrepreneurship</u> is a place where students of all majors can enroll in a certificate program; participate in peer-led workshops; and engage in business development, entrepreneurship, and innovation.

<u>Professional Development and Life-Long Learning</u> offers continuing education courses on campus and customized training options for individuals and in partnership with businesses and organizations in the community.

The North Central Indiana Small Business Development Center, Housed at IU South Bend's Judd Leighton School of Business and Economics, helps small businesses start, grow, finance, innovate, and transition through no-cost, confidential business advising and training.

Economic Impact

IU South Bend directly and indirectly contributes millions of dollars to the economic development of the South Bend region. IU South Bend created \$364.1 million for the regional economy in FY 2018-19. One out of every 77 jobs in the IU South Bend service area is supported by the activities of IU South Bend and its students.

Furthermore, the average bachelor's degree graduate from IU South Bend saw an increase in annual earnings of \$21,000 over their working lives compared to someone with a high school diploma working in Indiana. For every \$1 students invest in their education at IU South Bend, they will receive \$4.30 in higher lifetime earnings. This illustrates the positive impact that IU South Bend has on our students and our communities.

Diversity, Equity, and Inclusion

IU South Bend is committed to promoting an environment that is welcoming and supportive of its diverse faculty, staff, and students. A campus Diversity, Equity, and Inclusion committee serves the community in developing and implementing programs and initiatives in support of advancing campus DEI goals. IU South Bend is particularly focused on identifying systems of oppression and deconstructing them, increasing recruitment, hiring, and retention of faculty and staff from historically underrepresented communities, and fostering belonging as an inclusive, safe, and affirming campus for all members of the campus community. This fall IU South Bend will be furthering these efforts by launching a Center for Understanding, Belonging, and Experiences.

Currently, 35.7 percent of the total population are students of color, 33.7 percent of the total population are underrepresented students of color, 34.6 percent of the Honors Program are students of color, 40.5 percent of the population are first-generation college students, 42.6 percent of the total undergraduate population are Pell recipients, 26.8 percent are non-traditional aged students, and 19.6 percent of faculty and staff are persons of color. IU South Bend is an emerging Hispanic Serving Institution.

IU South Bend's Civil Rights Heritage Center focuses on education, culture, and activism. It is housed on the west side of South Bend in the former Engman Public Natatorium, a place that excluded and then segregated African Americans. The Center operates as a space to meet, hold classes, and host a wide range of educational and cultural programming to engage the public in conversations on issues and concerns of local and national importance. It also functions as a community resource for local grassroots activism. As importantly, it functions as a living museum that simultaneously preserves and honors past struggles for civil rights and social justice in the Northern Indiana region while initiating and supporting contemporary efforts to advance the unfinished fight for justice.

Finances

The annual FY2024-25 all-funds operating budget for IU South Bend is just over \$77 million, consisting of General, Designated, Restricted, and Auxiliary Funds. Approximately 54 percent of the General Fund budget is derived from tuition and fees, 45 percent from state appropriations, and the rest from gifts, indirect research costs, and other sources. Indiana University is known nationally for its implementation of responsibility-centered management (RCM), which began in 1989. All campuses, including IU South Bend, manage their revenue streams under the RCM model. The university is implementing a budget model redesign that is intended to align resources with incentives to advance IU's strategic plan, IU 2030. Phase I of the redesign, which addresses funding to central university units, will be effective 7/1/2024, followed by Phase II - campus-level funding allocation alignment - to be implemented in FY2025-26.

Tuition revenue at IU South Bend stays at the institution, and the campus' state appropriation is a line item within the state of Indiana budget that goes directly to the campus. IU South Bend, as will all campuses, contributes to the specified cost of services provided by Indiana University. The state appropriation includes outcomes-based performance funding. Campuses are evaluated on the basis of a series of performance metrics which determine additional allocations from the state. Four-year graduation rates, degree progress benchmarks, adult enrollment, and completion, the number of STEM graduates, and the number of Pell-eligible students who graduate are a few of the metrics used to determine performance dollars for public universities in Indiana. IU South Bend has shown increases in all the above metrics in the past few years and benefited from performance funding.

Additionally, to further educate the campus community on the budgeting process, engage campus stakeholders in the budget process, and plan strategically for the future, the Chancellor established a new Campus Budget

Advisory Council that is co-chaired by the Vice Chancellor for Administration and Finance and the Executive Vice Chancellor for Academic Affairs. A financial sustainability initiative was launched in January 2022 to better align resources with priorities, and much progress has been made to create a more responsible and responsive budget.

There are over 37,000 alumni of IU South Bend, 64% of which live and work in the region, serving as teachers and principals in our local schools, IT and business professionals who help drive our local economy, and public servants, social workers, health care professionals, and community leaders making a difference in the lives of our community members every day.

IU South Bend has an Advancement team that fosters a strong culture of philanthropy on campus and in the community. As Indiana University and the IU Foundation prepare for its next campaign, IU South Bend will build upon the success of the past and drive the program's continued growth. The Chancellor will play a pivotal role in shaping the campaign's vision and priorities, setting ambitious goals, and actively engaging with donors and partners. The Chancellor will partner with the IU Foundation and Campus Advancement team by building relationships with key stakeholders and serving as an enthusiastic ambassador for the university's fundraising initiatives.

Location

IU South Bend is located on the St. Joseph River, approximately ten minutes from the South Bend city center, in north central Indiana, an area that extends north to the Michigan state line. The city's population is just over 100,000 but combined with the neighboring towns of Mishawaka, Elkhart, and Granger, the population of the region is approximately 350,000. The region is home to multiple colleges and universities, and it has extensive cultural amenities, including the Civic Theatre as well as the Morris, which hosts a Broadway series, and the long-established South Bend Symphony Orchestra. There are multiple parks and recreational opportunities in the area, including the recently renovated Howard Park with its new skating ribbon and fire pits just a mile and a half from IU South Bend. Housing prices in the area remain affordable and with much variety, be it single-family homes or condominiums. A well-established health care community provides all levels of support from primary care to urgent, emergency, and hospital care.

South Bend also enjoys an excellent set of restaurants with a wide range of cuisines. Downtown, walkable events include outdoor live music. South Bend is less than a two-hour drive from Chicago and the South Shore train provides easy access to downtown Chicago several times a day. Lake Michigan's beaches and water-based activities and the newly designated national park at the Indiana Dunes are a 45-minute drive from South Bend. Outdoor activities in the immediate area include many opportunities to enjoy an active lifestyle such as hiking, birdwatching, cross-country skiing, ice skating, fishing, and canoeing. A downtown stadium hosts the South Bend Cubs, a minor-league baseball team. Several history and art museums round out a full set of community amenities.

Indiana University: An Overview

With seven campuses serving approximately 90,000 students, Indiana University is one of the nation's oldest and largest state universities. It was founded in 1820, only four years after Indiana achieved statehood. More than 83 percent of Indiana's population lives within 50 miles of one of the seven campuses.

The institution is governed by the Trustees of Indiana University, who are charged with policy and decision-making authority, granted by the Indiana General Assembly, to carry out the programs and missions of the University. The university is led by President Pamela Whitten and other university officers, and a chancellor on

six of the regional campuses and at the Bloomington Campus.

Indiana University is comprised of the following core campuses:

And the following regional campuses:
Indiana University East (Richmond)

Indiana University also offers courses through facilities in Columbus, Fort Wayne, and several other sites throughout the state. Indiana University operates year-round with two academic semesters and summer school programs of varied lengths, depending on the campus. In 2022-23, 23,814 degrees were awarded throughout the university.

Indiana University has approximately 5,905 full-time faculty or lecturer-rank appointees and generated approximately 2,245,000 credit hours in fall 2023 and spring 2024 combined.

Approximately 71 percent of all students are Indiana residents. The total university budget for 2024-25 is \$4.5 billion, consisting of revenues from the Indiana General Assembly, student instructional fees, student housing and dining income, government and private gifts and grants, revenue from hospitals, and other income from sales and services. This budget includes \$2.5 billion in general operating funds, over \$1.1 billion in restricted fund groups, over \$533 million for auxiliary and service fund groups, and \$319M in medical practice funds. Indiana University has more than 740,000 living alumni worldwide.

The Indiana University Foundation maximizes private support for Indiana University by fostering lifelong relationships with key stakeholders and providing advancement leadership and fundraising services for campuses and units across the University.

Indiana University prides itself on being open to serve the people of Indiana.

- The seven campuses offer more than 1,500 IU degree programs.
- Current university-wide enrollment is approximately 90,000 students.
- 47 percent of degree-seeking undergraduates at four-year public universities in Indiana are Indiana University students.
- Indiana University provides thousands of services for the people of Indiana.

The typical course load for faculty is four courses, though many faculty have a one course release for research. Of the nine Trustees, the Governor of the State appoints five and the alumni elect three. A full-time student, appointed by the Governor, fills the ninth slot for a two-year period.

The president is appointed by the trustees to be the chief executive of the university. Pamela Whitten became Indiana University's nineteenth president on July 1, 2021.

Position Requirements and Qualifications

The Chancellor is the Chief Executive Officer of IU South Bend and reports to the Vice President of Regional Campuses and Online Education. The Chancellor works closely with the Vice President and senior administration of Indiana University. On the South Bend campus, the Chancellor's senior administration team includes the Executive Vice Chancellor for Academic Affairs, the Vice Chancellor for Student Engagement, the Vice Chancellor for Administration and Finance, the Vice Chancellor for University Relations and Advancement, the Chief Information Officer, and the Chief of Staff.

The Chancellor will lead IU South Bend in advancing its contributions to fulfilling the mission of Indiana University. In addition, the Chancellor will guide IU South Bend in commitments to excellence in teaching and scholarship, student-centeredness, service learning, and engaged citizenship. The Chancellor will provide strong leadership in achieving current goals and also establishing new and ambitious ones to move the campus forward.

The new Chancellor will demonstrate:

- Deep understanding of and respect for academic values and the traditions of higher education, as well as the ability to grasp and manage the demands of the market and the new forces of technology that have an impact on all universities today.
- Capacity to articulate a broad vision for the IU South Bend campus within Indiana University and among the Indiana University regional campuses, which will allow the campus to leverage the strengths of the university and build on its unique strengths and position.
- A record of commitment to and leadership in diversity and inclusion.
- Thorough understanding of the importance of strong enrollment management strategies in a highly competitive environment.
- Ability to build support and marshal resources for various initiatives and to achieve goals through appropriate engagement with the campus community.
- A commitment to and understanding of the importance of shared governance and shared decisionmaking.
- Ability to lead fundraising efforts that will attract the external resources necessary not only in relation to the budget but also to achieve a higher level of institutional success.
- Commitment to serving and advocating for students and to the establishment of a student-centered atmosphere with a focus on access, affordability, and student success.
- Commitment to faculty and staff development.
- Commitment to athletic programs and high-impact learning experiences for students.
- Familiarity with the complexities of leading a regional campus within a university-wide system, and the ability both to serve the needs of the campus and region, and to work collaboratively with faculty, students, community, and the president and senior officers, as well as with other regional campuses.
- Ability to connect with and collaborate with business and community leaders and understand regional relevance.
- Commitment to offering a rich liberal arts education to the community served.
- Commitment to advancing the IU South Bend mission as an engaged campus, including articulating

views and values that build partnerships and collaboration with local and regional entities in the Michiana region.

- Ability to work effectively with legislative leaders.
- Ability to strengthen alumni relations and engage graduates.
- A transparent leadership and communication style.
- Ability to be strategically innovative.
- Credentials and characteristics that will earn the respect of the academic community.
- Personal qualities include energy and creativity, leadership, integrity, selflessness, effective listening skills, negotiating skills, creative problem solving abilities, the ability to be decisive and yet respectful of the deliberative process, patience, humor, and trustworthiness.

Strong candidates will have a demonstrated record of leadership as an executive officer in a complex organization, preferably in higher education, including a passion for student success. A deep knowledge and understanding of the academic mission and fundraising are strongly preferred. Candidates should demonstrate strategic thinking and also possess outstanding interpersonal and communication skills, be collaborative and creative, and be able to articulate a vision to diverse audiences.
